ENGINEERS-IN TRAINING (EIT) SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

The Engineers-in Training (EIT) Sponsorship Program is one of NEDEAN's flagship initiatives, created with the vision of empowering socially and economically disadvantaged fresh graduates and bridging the gap between academia and industry.

Fresh graduates often face immense challenges when entering the job market—limited professional networks, lack of practical exposure, and underdeveloped soft skills. Many talented young engineers, especially those from modest backgrounds, struggle to find meaningful opportunities that align with their skills and education.

The EIT Program addresses these challenges head-on by sponsoring selected graduates for a six-month Engineer-in-Training placement with established engineering firms in Karachi. The program covers a monthly stipend equivalent to an entry-level salary, while host firms provide hands-on training and mentorship - all at no financial cost to the organizations. This creates a win-win: candidates gain professional exposure and mentorship, while firms get access to bright, motivated graduates they can evaluate as potential long-term hires.

Purpose and Benefits

The program focuses on supporting graduates from low- to middle-income families and aims to:

- Enhance both technical and soft skills such as time management, communication, and critical thinking.
- Provide meaningful work experience that increases employability.
- Offer host firms a chance to evaluate talent before making hiring decisions.

Progress and Achievements

Since its inception, the EIT Program has steadily gained momentum. The dedicated teams in Karachi and Dallas have worked tirelessly in unison, driven by the mission of creating opportunities for graduates who might otherwise be left behind.

Key milestones so far include:

- Transitioning the application and screening process fully online, ensuring transparency and accessibility.
- Signing MOUs with six leading engineering firms in Karachi















- Successfully placing three candidates into training programs.
- Providing continuous mentorship during placements to help candidates adapt to professional environments.
- Assuring positive outcomes, with candidates becoming competitive in the open job market.

The results speak for themselves. One of our first candidates secured a permanent role at double the stipend she initially received from EIT, midway through her training program. These early successes confirm that the program is meeting its mission—creating opportunities, enhancing employability, and changing lives.


Among these stories, one stands out as a powerful testament to human resilience and the role of EIT in transforming lives—the journey of Sardar Wahab Khan.

MY JOURNEY WITH NEDEAN-EIT

During my final semester at NED University, life took a turn I could never have imagined. I was run over by a bus, leaving my right leg badly injured while four of my final exams were still pending. My family urged me to defer, but I refused to give up. With the help of my parents, who brought me to campus in an ambulance every day, I completed my exams in a wheelchair.

The last exam remains etched in my memory as both the hardest and proudest day of my life. Despite bleeding, severe pain, shivering, and a 105°F fever, I sat through the exam hall and completed the paper—fulfilling my parents' 22-year dream of seeing me graduate. Immediately afterward, I was admitted to the hospital, but I had achieved what I had fought for.













Six months later, as my leg began to heal, I came across the EIT Sponsorship Program. With renewed hope, I applied and was shortlisted. Just before the interview, however, I began to experience unbearable back pain. Tests revealed a disc bulge from the accident—an undiagnosed injury that left me unable to sit, travel, or even sleep properly. It felt like my professional career had ended before it even began.



But EIT never gave up on me. They interviewed me despite my condition, referred me to companies, and most importantly, never stopped checking on my health. The compassion and support I received from Sir Nayyar Mannan, Madam Yasmeen Hashmi, and Sir Javaid Iqbal reminded me of family. They made sure I never felt alone in my struggle.



In May 2025, EIT arranged for me to begin working remotely with Exponent Engineering. That opportunity became a turning point in my recovery. For the past three months, I have been working from home, and Alhamdulillah, I am steadily improving while gaining professional experience.



To me, EIT is not just a program—it is a lifeline. It gave me hope when I was close to giving up, encouragement when I felt lost, and a path to move forward. They turned my darkest days into a new beginning, and for that, I will always remember EIT with gratitude and prayers.

Stories like Wahab's remind us why the EIT Sponsorship Program is so important. It is not just about training engineers - it is about uplifting lives, building confidence, and creating opportunities where none existed before. NEDEAN remains committed to expanding this initiative, signing more partnerships with engineering firms, and opening doors for the next generation of NED graduates.



For the past two years, NEDEAN has been providing employment opportunities to talented yet economically underprivileged fresh graduates through its fully sponsored six-month Engineers in Training (EIT) Program. This initiative has successfully enabled participants to gain practical experience and integrate into the mainstream job market, where they can compete with confidence.

Building on this success, NEDEAN is now proud to announce a new training initiative designed to further enhance the skill set and market value of fresh graduates. This program will focus on Project Management training, fully sponsored by NEDEAN for disadvantaged graduates, and offered at a nominal fee for those who are able to self-sponsor.

The training will cover Oracle Primavera Enterprise Enterprise Project Portfolio Management (EPPM) P6, equipping students with skills in:

- Preparing construction schedules
- Creating WBS and activity/ID codes
- Allocating resources and estimating manhours

- Developing baseline schedules, updating and monitoring progress
- Analyzing cost and schedule variances
- Creating manpower histograms and Scurves
- Preparing catch-up and look-ahead schedules
- Generating reports and forecasts

We are honored to have Mr. Masroor Ahmed, a distinguished NED alumnus (Civil Engineering, Class of 1975) and esteemed member of the NEDEAN EIT Team, leading this program. With more than 40 years of experience in Project Management and Cost Control across large-scale projects in Pakistan and Saudi Arabia, Mr. Ahmed brings unparalleled expertise. He previously ran the Cadcom Institute of Project Management (2008–2012) before continuing his professional journey in Saudi Arabia.


Through this initiative, NEDEAN reaffirms its commitment to empowering fresh graduates by bridging the gap between academics and industry, ensuring that NEDians remain competitive in the global workforce.

LEGACY ROOTED IN SERVICE THE DINSHAW FAMILY:

The origin story of NED University is deeply rooted in Pakistan's engineering heritage and civic progress. Its foundations were laid in response to one of the most ambitious infrastructure projects of colonial India the Sukkur Barrage, a massive irrigation and water management project launched in the early 1920s. As this colossal undertaking advanced, it revealed a critical gap in the availability of locally trained engineers. The government responded by establishing a technical institution in Karachi in 1921, then called the Prince of Wales Engineering College. The institution was set up to train civil engineers capable of supporting the construction and future operation of the barrage and other public works across the region.

Yet the long-term success and stability of this college came not just from policy—but from philanthropy. The turning point came in 1924, when the college was renamed the NED (Nadirshaw Edulji Dinshaw) Government Engineering College, in honor of the monumental contribution of Mr. Nadirshaw Edulji Dinshaw, a prominent philanthropist and business magnate from Karachi's Parsi community.

Nadirshaw Edulji Dinshaw belonged to a distinguished family known for their civic-mindedness, enterprise, and generosity. He was the son of Edulji Dinshaw, one of the richest and most influential philanthropists in colonial Sindh. Continuing in his father's footsteps, Nadirshaw played a significant role in shaping Karachi's educational and health infrastructure. His endowment to the engineering college not only ensured its survival but also laid the foundation for its future growth. It enabled the expansion of facilities, procurement of equipment, recruitment of qualified faculty, and the advancement of technical education in the region.






LEGACY...

Beyond the NED College, Nadirshaw and the Dinshaw family left an enduring legacy through numerous other philanthropic works across Karachi and beyond:

- Edulji Dinshaw Dispensary: Built in 1882, this historic building in Saddar still stands as a testament to the family's commitment to public health.
- Lady Dufferin Hospital: The Dinshaw family were among the major donors to this iconic women's hospital in Karachi.
- Mama Parsi Girls' Secondary School:
 Founded in part by Edulji Dinshaw, the school advanced the cause of girls' education in a time when such opportunities were rare.
- Support for libraries, hostels, and Parsi community centers: Their philanthropy extended to the intellectual and cultural upliftment of the city's diverse communities.

NED Today – A Living Legacy


In 1977, the institution evolved into a full-fledged university—NED University of Engineering & Technology—reflecting its broadened scope and national importance. Today, it stands as one of Pakistan's most respected institutions for engineering education, serving thousands of students across multiple campuses and disciplines.

The legacy of Nadirshaw Edulji Dinshaw is not merely etched into the university's name, it is embedded in its mission, values, and enduring impact on the nation. As students, alumni, and supporters of NED, we honor a heritage built on knowledge, service, and selfless giving—values championed by the Dinshaw family nearly a century ago.

Sukkur Barrage – An Engineering Marvel

- Commissioned: 1923
- Completed: 1932
- Designed by: Sir Arnold Musto
- Purpose: Irrigation of 7 million acres of farmland
- Legacy: Still operational; sparked the need for technical institutions like NED.
- The Dinshaw Family's Philanthropic Footprint
- Edulji Dinshaw Dispensary (1882). Located on Preedy Street, Saddar, Karachi
- It is still operational as a charitable dispensary for the Citizens of Pakistan





IN MEMORIAM: ENGR. SYED ZAINUL ABIDEEN (1923-2025)

A Pioneer from NED who served the humanity.


With deep respect, we remember Engineer Syed Zainul Abideen, one of the most senior alumni of NED Engineering College, who passed away earlier this year at the age of 101. His century-long life combined engineering brilliance, humility, and a spirit of service that touched countless lives.

Early Life and Education

Born on November 23, 1923, in Jaipur, India, Abideen faced hardship early when his father passed away during his school years. After Partition, he migrated to Pakistan and joined NED Engineering College, Karachi, completing his civil engineering degree in 1951 with the support of Prof. Rustom Mirza and a scholarship blessed by Quaide-Azam Muhammad Ali Jinnah.

Building Pakistan

Abideen began his career with the Karachi Municipal Corporation before joining WAPDA in 1959, where he played a pivotal role in constructing Rawal Dam, Pakistan's first major dam built without foreign aid. His name is engraved on a marble stone at the site. He is also believed to have contributed to Warsak and Tarbela Dam projects. Alongside his career, he pursued graduate studies in civil engineering, reflecting his lifelong passion for learning.



IN MEMORIAM: . . .

Global Engineering Career

In 1970, Abideen moved to the U.S., working with firms such as Chas T. Main and Louis Berger International. His work took him to Iran, Sri Lanka, South Korea, and the U.S., where he spent two decades contributing to major water and infrastructure projects. He earned his Professional Engineer license in Massachusetts in 1989.

A Life of Simplicity and Faith

Despite his professional stature, Abideen lived humbly. After retirement, he resided in a modest retirement home in Boston, living independently into his late 90s. A devout man, he prayed daily, fasted throughout Ramadan, and centered his life around faith.

Silent Humanitarian

Few knew of his generosity: he quietly supported eight families in Karachi, sending much of his U.S. pension for their basic needs. His giving was consistent, heartfelt, and anonymous — an enduring example of compassion in action.



NED Centennial Appearance

In 2022, at nearly 99, Abideen traveled from Boston to Karachi to attend NED University's 100th Anniversary as its most senior living alumnus. His presence was a highlight of the celebration, where he prayed for the alumni community and shared words of wisdom. True to his nature, he sought no recognition and remained gracious and composed.

Legacy

From Rawal Dam to international projects, Abideen's professional legacy spanned continents. Equally important was his desire to give back to Pakistan, even in his later years, offering to help refurbish small dams free of cost. His life embodied intellect, service, and humility — qualities that will continue to inspire NEDEANS for generations.

Engr. Syed Zainul Abideen's story reminds us that greatness is not measured by titles or wealth but by what we give to others. "The true measure of greatness is in what we give, not what we receive." — Engr. Syed Zainul Abideen. May his soul rest in eternal peace.



In Memoriam: Dr. Jameel Ahmed Khan (1938–2025)

Dr. Jameel Ahmed Khan, a distinguished academic, visionary leader, and dedicated mentor, passed away on Friday, August 22, 2025 (Inna Lillahi wa Inna Ilayhi Raj'oon).

He served as Vice Chancellor of NED University of Engineering and Technology (1987–1991) and earlier as Chairman and Professor of Mechanical Engineering, From 1999 to 2010, he was honored as Professor Emeritus, leaving a lasting mark on engineering education and research in Pakistan. Beyond NED, he contributed nationally as a twoterm Chairman of the Pakistan Engineering Council (1997-1999, 2000-2002) and as the Founder President of the Pakistan Academy of Engineering, where he championed the advancement of professional engineering institutions across the country.

Dr. Jameel Ahmed Khan's passing is a profound loss to the engineering and academic community of Pakistan. His visionary leadership, lifelong dedication, and enduring contributions will continue to inspire generations of engineers.
